Voices for Independence

We have some good news and bad news.

The good news is: for the very first time, people with disabilities can open special accounts where they can save money *without* jeopardizing their eligibility for Social Security and other benefits. Ohio's STABLE accounts allow participants to set aside up to \$14,000 annually to pay for education, healthcare, transportation, housing and other expenses without losing their disability benefits.

It's a huge step in the right direction and finally opens a path for individuals with special needs and disabilities to strive and have upward mobility and earning potential.

A public service announcement featuring Ohio State football head coach Urban Myer and Ohio Treasurer Josh Mandel has been airing since June.

The bad news, this legislation comes too late for many Ohioans with disabilities, including the majority of our residents, who have aged well beyond their prime employable years. These individuals still require our collective assistance in order to live full, happy, and complete lives.

Lourdes University Students, Faculty, and Staff

With Sister Barbara's support, we were honored to be among 12 local nonprofit agencies to take part in Lourdes University's 'First Year Experience' (FYE) course. On Friday, August 19, over 270 Lourdes students, faculty and staff traveled to area nonprofits including Bethany House, Toledo Metroparks, Seagate Food Bank, and more for a morning of service to others. In just one morning, Lourdes provided the community with more than 800 hours of community service.

We had a wonderful group of first year students and orientation team leaders join us at River Crossings. Our group included nine incoming freshman who engaged the individuals in a fun art and crafts project designing brightly colored tie-dye shirts and socks. The students helped by twisting and wrapping the shirts tight while individuals wielded

the dye, creating their own color combinations and patterns.

What an impressive group of young students; we were humbled by the energy, enthusiasm, and patience of these future leaders.

Days like this also serve as a valuable reminder of how lucky we are for our amazing staff. Josina Lott staffers Katie and Courtney of River Crossings planned and coordinated our tie-dye project from start to finish and made the art of controlling chaos look pretty simple.

Annual Board of Directors Retreat Reaffirms Our Commitment to Mission

Josina Lott Administrative Staff joined the Board of Directors on November 4th for a day of reflection and strategic planning for fiscal year 2017.

With a key piece of legislation seeking to impose substantial changes to Ohio's system of caring for individuals with disabilities, there was no shortage of items to address on the agenda.

A lawsuit (Ball vs. Kasich) filed by Disability Rights Ohio in March of this year would severely undermine the disability care model involving Intermediate Care Facilities like Josina Lott. The suit essentially asserts that "virtually any person (including those who require the very highest level of care) can be served safely and successfully in an integrated, home and community based setting."

We, like many concerned Ohio families, strongly disagree that there is a one-size fits all disability model of care. The important decision of where the most disabled citizens of Ohio receive their care should be left to the individual who requires services and their loved ones.

We continue to monitor the situation closely and are working through the Ohio Provider Resource Association (OPRA) to ensure that the legal rights of persons with acute disabilities remain protected.

Annual Board of Directors Retreat Reaffirms Our Commitment to Mission

Josina Lott Administrative Staff joined the Board of Directors on November 4th for a day of reflection and strategic planning for fiscal year 2017.

With a key piece of legislation seeking to impose substantial changes to Ohio's system of caring for individuals with disabilities, there was no shortage of items to address on the agenda.

A lawsuit (Ball vs. Kasich) filed by Disability Rights Ohio in March of this year would severely undermine the disability care model involving Intermediate Care Facilities like Josina Lott. The suit essentially asserts that "virtually any person (including those who require the very highest level of care) can be served safely and successfully in an integrated, home and community based setting."

We, like many concerned Ohio families, strongly disagree that there is a one-size fits all disability model of care. The important decision of where the most disabled citizens of Ohio receive their care should be left to the individual who requires services and their loved ones.

We continue to monitor the situation closely and are working through the Ohio Provider Resource Association (OPRA) to ensure that the legal rights of persons with acute disabilities remain protected.
